



LATROBE PRIZE

The Latrobe Prize is a biennial \$150,000 award from the AIA College of Fellows to support a two-year program of research selected by jury review. The grant, named for architect Benjamin Henry Latrobe, is awarded for research leading to significant advances in the architecture profession.

COMPONENT GRANTS

The College of Fellows has established the AIA College of Fellows Component Grant to assist AIA components in developing programs that enhance the development of emerging architects and welcome others into the profession.

We encourage new directions in mentorship, enhancement of existing programs, and outreach to currently underrepresented groups. Proposed programs can be directed to a range of participants, from K-12 students to professionals seeking Fellowship, and encourage collaborative programs between local AIA components and schools, colleges, community groups, and professional firms. Grants of up to \$8,000 are awarded directly to the proposing AIA components.

Fellows are a unique resource and can have an important role in these programs.

ALIGN MENTORING PROGRAM

The Young Architects Forum and College of Fellows Align Mentoring Program is a long-range initiative (think ten years, not one) that connects young architects with AIA Fellows.

Through a grouping system referred to as "pods", the program pairs four to six young architects with two to three Fellows facilitating professional and leadership development. Align began as a pilot program in late 2019, launching its first open call for applications and cohort in 2022. Since then, the program has brought together more than 100 young architect and Fellow participants.

The program's objectives are:

- To support young architects in defining their legacy within the profession while navigating their career paths.
- To create a vehicle for mentorship and career development that connects young architects and Fellows with peers across the country.
- To accelerate contributions of young architects and develop regionally diverse collectives to contribute more in the future.

ADDITIONAL INITIATIVES

- Opportunity Grants for unique programs aligned with the College Mission
- **INSPIRE at AIA National Conference**: a collaboration with the College and the AIA K-12 IDEA group that brings local students to conference for an architectural immersion program
- The Upjohn Research Initiative supports applied research projects that enhance the value of design and professional practice knowledge. The program funds up to six research grants of \$15,000–\$30,000 annually for projects completed within an 18-month period.

- Mentorship resources in addition to your network of colleagues, resources to consider include your state and local components, the COF regional representative network, and your Knowledge Communities.
- **Contact your state component** to see what Fellowship support they offer. Some have formal processes while others have informal review committees.
- Your Fellowship **application must be nominated** by one of the following (this is separate from your sponsor):
 - The Governing board of any State or Local Chapter <u>OR</u>
 - A minimum of five (5) Fellows <u>OR</u>
 - A minimum of (10) Architect members residing anywhere

- Look for state, regional and national opportunities to share your expertise and build a record of accomplishment. Look to do more than occupy a role – make an impact and document it!
- Study portfolio examples at AIA.org: The best of portfolio examples provide guidance for organization, use of images and clarity in general and illustrate successful presentations unique to each object as well.

YOUR SPONSOR

- They must be an **FAIA** or **AIA** member in good standing, ideally NOT someone from your firm.
- They provide a one-page letter of support that must speak directly and specifically to your accomplishments, establishing the case and reinforcing your summary page.
- Your sponsor should be a strong supporter and a strong critic!
- Your sponsor should know you and your work well. Avoid 'big name' architects that are not very familiar with your story.
- Your sponsor will be a critical point of contact with your reference letter writers.
- Make sure they have time to focus on you!

YOUR OBJECT & SUB-OBJECT

- Fellowship is awarded in one of six Objects.
- The jury considers how candidates have shown accomplishment within the specific context of the Object identified.
- Each candidate is required to select one Object with one Sub-Object and is encouraged to choose the Object and Sub-Object which best describes the focus of the candidate's impact through their "Ripple Effect" on the profession or society, around which the content of the submittal should be developed.
- The Sub-Object should serve as an overarching framework
 that highlights the area of impact, and frames the story being
 told as to how the candidate's achievements have benefited
 the profession or society beyond their own firm or
 community through the "Ripple Effect".

- There are 6 Objects, each with a required Sub-Object selection.
- Review sample application on AIA.org for detailed requirements, specific to each Object/Sub-Object.

OBJECT ONE

To promote the aesthetic, scientific, and practical efficiency of the profession.

3 Sub-objects: Design, Urban Design and Planning, Preservation.

Fellowship in this Object is granted to architects who have produced an extensive body of distinguished work that has been broadly recognized for its design excellence by their peers, the media, and/or through publications to have a significant effect on the trajectory of architectural design. Work should exhibit excellence through a holistic approach that integrates creativity, functionality, sustainability, user-centricity, context sensitivity, and cultural relevance to create meaningful and impactful built environments that enrich the lives of people and communities. Works submitted may be of any size, for any client, of any scope, and reflecting any type of architectural design service. Ideally AIA Framework for Design context should be part of the submittal. This may be accomplished through individual or collaborative effort with the applicant playing a significant role in the design.

- **Design** may include design of a building or project.
- Urban Design and Planning may include design related to a city, district, or campus.
- Preservation may include design related to the restoration, conservation, and/or the rehabilitation of a culturally significant work (this differs from the Sub-object of Technical Advancement in Preservation of Object Two).

OBJECT TWO

To advance the science and art of planning and building by advancing the standards of practice.

2 Sub-Objects: Practice Management,
Practice Technical Advancement

Fellowship in this Object is granted to architects who have made notable contributions through their work in the practice of architecture.

- **Practice Management** may include firm leadership, management, administration, or project management.
- Practice Technical Advancement may include specific building types such as Education, Healthcare, etc., and/or technical expertise such as building performance, envelope design, etc. (For example, practice technical advancement of preservation projects might be based on the architect's strong commitment to historical research, implementation of unique preservation techniques, and coupled with their strong focus on the actual construction implementation to enhance our physical heritage.)

OBJECT THREE

To lead the building industry and the profession of architecture.

2 Sub-Objects: Led the Institute, Led a Related Organization

Fellowship in this Object is granted to architects who have actively, efficiently, and cooperatively **led the Institute or a related professional organization over a sustained period of time and have gained widespread recognition for the results of their work**. Architects applying in this Object should include information to show how they:

- **Elevated the role of the profession and the Institute** (or related organization) in the eyes of the community.
- **Enhanced the visibility** of the Institute (or related organization).
- **Directly impacted members' engagement** with the Institute (or related organization), that through their actions members are more invested/engaged with the Institute (or related organization) and its mission; make note if the value of the Institute (or related organization) to members has been improved and how.
- Created or enhanced initiatives that empower members to be more active in the Institute (or related organization) and/or their community, how members have been affected by these initiatives, show if these initiatives have been replicated or inspired others to create new initiatives in their regions, and can initiatives sustain themselves once candidate is no longer involved.
- Show impact beyond their chapter's geographic location, i.e., your "ripple effect" on the profession or society.

OBJECT FOUR

To ensure the advancement of the living standards of people through leadership of planning and design within an institution or organization that leads to their improved environment and long-term impact.

3 Sub-Objects: Public Service, Government (including serving IN government through elected office or planning/ building official), Industry Organizations

Fellowship in this Object is granted to architects who have made notable contributions in public service, government, or industry organizations by providing transformative leadership in architecture, planning, and design of an organization's unique built environment. Architects applying in this Object will have clearly raised the standards of professional practice within organizations they are part of by leading positive change that advances the mission, impact, visibility, and effectiveness of organizations. Significant improvements can include such elements as conservation, beautification, and expansion of buildings, landscape, infrastructure, land-use regulation, transportation infrastructure, removal, or transformation of blighted areas.

- Public Service may include providing leadership as an architect within the public service sector including areas such as transportation infrastructure, energy and environmental industry, public libraries, public art, public foundations.
- Government may include providing leadership as an architect within the military, regional, national, or international government service areas such as embassies, government funded programs such the Peace Corps or Army Corp of Engineers.
- **Industry Organizations** may include providing leadership as an architect within areas such as healthcare, education, higher education, community foundations, and cultural institutions or systems.

OBJECT FIVE

To make the profession of everincreasing service to society from outside the profession.

3 Sub-Objects: Alternative Career, Service to Society, Volunteer Work with Organizations not directly connected with the Built Environment

Fellowship in this Object is granted to architects who have made notable contributions to one of the following:

- Alternative Career may include a career related to architecture that illustrates outstanding achievements that support the architectural profession.
- **Service to Society** may include extensive volunteer work related to architecture with organizations not directly connected with the built environment.
- Work with Organizations not directly connected with the Built Environment may include service that transcends the customary architectural practice that have wide reaching impacts that serve as a national model.

OBJECT SIX

To advance the science and art of planning and building by advancing the standards of architectural education and training.

3 Sub-Objects: Education, Research, Literature

Fellowship in this Object is granted to architects who have made notable contributions to one of the following:

- Work in Education may include teaching, research, administration, or writing and should have a lasting impact, be widely recognized, and provide meaningful contributions to academic thought and scholarship including a commitment to intellectual curiosity, rigor, integrity, and the pursuit of knowledge for the betterment of society.
- Work in Research may include building codes and standards, specifications, new material applications, or inventions. Research should include work that has advanced the profession, informed design practice, or has addressed pressing global issues related to sustainability, urbanization, health, and social justice.
- Work in Literature may include writings that have inspired critical thinking, fostered innovation, and contributed to the ongoing dialogue about the role of architecture in shaping the world we inhabit.

- Use the available page limit to its full advantage
- Use the organizational structure outlined in the current sample application
- Tell the jury what you did and why it matters
- Give the jury specifics!

YOUR STORY: IT'S ABOUT YOU!

Focus your story through the lens of the object and sub-object you select. Review the object and sub-object descriptions in the sample application thoroughly. Present accomplishments that are directly object related first and prioritize the object related view.

Every candidate ready to submit for Fellowship has a diverse range of accomplishments; presenting these without focus weakens the story and your case for elevation. That said, presentation of all significant accomplishments in context can be helpful if organized well.

- Who are you?
- What are your accomplishments?
- When and Where did they occur?
- Why are they Significant?
- How did they benefit the profession or society?

YOUR STORY: TELL IT & SHOW IT!

Sponsor letter introduces the case.

Summary provides thesis and key points.

Significant work provides facts to support the case.

Exhibits provide more robust detail on key projects to further illustrate your case.

Reference Letters provide specific supportive, reinforcing statements of your key accomplishments.

- How does your impact go beyond your job?
- How is what you accomplished aligned with the object criteria?
- So what?!
- Focus on results, metrics, and achievements
- Demonstrate impactful influence on the profession or society through your "ripple effect"

YOUR STORY: THE RIPPLE EFFECT

Demonstrating Impact.

Provide evidence of your 'ripple effect' with statistics or metrics.

Fellowship is NOT a Lifetime Achievement Award!

Candidates for Fellowship in the AIA are required to submit an application that includes documentation of work that demonstrates the "ripple effect" they have had on the profession or society.

This is shorthand for the impact you and your work have had on the profession of architecture or on society, beyond the day-to-day work of your practice or outside your geographic region.

For example, "ripple effect" could be demonstrated by public speaking, presence in national and regional publications, authoring articles books or reports, mentoring, teaching, service to the profession, geographic impact, or legacy through others.

Contributions or influences might include such areas as diversity, sustainability, or the mentoring of emerging professionals, to the degree the candidate has had the opportunity to address them, or as these topics may enhance the presentation.

SUBMITTING YOUR APPLICATION

PROVE IT!

Use the 40-page limit to its full advantage; organize it clearly, follow the recommended structure, cross reference key honors and awards to significant work and provide introductory comments for unique items that jurors may not be familiar with. Avoid images that don't illustrate or enhance the portfolio information. The best of examples provide guidance for organization, use of images and clarity in general and illustrate successful presentations unique to each object as well.

Two pages maximum (per the 2025 sample application)

Section Two: Accomplishments

• Eighteen pages max (per the 2025 sample application)

Section Three: Exhibits

Twenty pages max (per the 2025 sample application)

SECTION ONE: SPONSOR LETTER

One page!

Addresses your achievements directly and specifically

- This letter sets the stage for the rest of the story that will be told in the candidate's portfolio
- Highlight key aspects of the candidate's summary of achievements
- Make it personal illustrate how you know the candidate
- Be clear about the most important object specific accomplishments

SECTION ONE: SUMMARY

One page!

Thesis for elevation

Clear concise succinct

Summary Statement ("Zinger")

the **most distilled version of your argument for elevation**. It should directly communicate impact and establish clear themes for the portfolio to follow

Summary of Achievements

a **high-level narrative** of why you should be elevated under the specified Object and Sub-Object. A strong summary page uses direct, clear language to communicate the key achievements and results that the portfolio will explore in greater detail in section two

- choose thematic areas for this page to focus on, all of which connect back to the Summary Statement (usually three main points)
- provide both an overview and specifics of your achievements and results in the thematic areas. Strong connection to the Sub-object selected is necessary.

SECTION TWO

18 pages maximum, in this specific order!

- 2.0 Curriculum Vitae
- 2.1 Significant Work
- 2.2 Significant Honors Awards and Recognition
- 2.3 Significant Publications
- 2.4 Significant Presentations and Speaking Engagements

Organize and Cross Reference

Prove the case you made in your summary

Demonstrate a broad ripple effect on the profession or society by describing your actions and impact, and by supporting impact with outcome data.

Describe achievements that relate directly to the Object and Sub-object first.

Organize by type or theme to communicate connection and support of your Object and/or the Summary Statement.

Explain time gaps.

Use the organizational structure provided in the sample application. Don't make it difficult to follow the ripple effect of YOUR story

SECTION THREE (EXHIBITS)

20 pages maximum!

Review sample application for object specific requirements that vary.

Explain the Challenge, your Role and the Results!

Avoid generic marketing language that doesn't speak to your impact.

Each Exhibit should be an in-depth documentation of a project that emphasizes your contributions and describes in detail how that your involvement directly resulted in its success. Typically, this section begins with the Exhibit that speaks most strongly to your Object and Sub-object, Summary Statement and Ripple Effect on the profession or society.

Provide required descriptive data!

Provide declaration of responsibility!

- They should speak directly about your accomplishments
- Seek recognized leaders in your field that amplify your ripple effect on the profession or society
- Avoid big names that don't know you and can't provide specific knowledge of your achievements – seek those with a direct connection to you

REFERENCES

Make each one count!

Line up your references EARLY

Refer to the sample application for specific requirements on letter quantity and number of AIA members required.

- Seek a broad geographic range
- Limit references from your own firm
- Each should focus on one or two points from your summary
- Ensure the reference letter writers are noting the correct object and subobject of the candidate


DO NOT CONTACT THE JURY – IT'S AN AUTOMATIC DISQUALIFICATION!

Specific formatting requirements are outlined in the sample application and <u>must</u> be followed.

- Sponsor letter
- Page limits
- Page size
- File type
- Number of exhibits (object specific)
- Declaration of responsibility
- Reference Letters: adhere to the maximum quantity and minimum of 5 member authors

Failure to meet requirements may result in disqualification.





THE JURY

- Jury members represent a diverse mix of demographics including geographical location and object of elevation.
- To protect the integrity of the awards process, <u>active</u>
 <u>candidates</u> <u>are prohibited from contacting members of the</u>


 <u>Jury during the application submission process.</u>
- Communication with any juror, from the time of submittal to completion of the jury process, by you or anyone acting on your behalf is **cause for immediate disqualification**.

JURY PROCESS

Each Juror "the reader" reviews their assigned candidate portfolios, prepares preliminary scoring comments and prepares a short presentation for the case for elevation in advance of deliberations.

All jurors review the summary section for all candidates prior to deliberations.

- Candidates are presented by the reader in a pre-determined order as assigned by staff.
- A juror is recused if they know the candidate well and cannot objectively participate in the review.
- The juror who is scheduled to present next typically will be recused to allow time for preparation.
- Other reasons a juror may recuse themselves include: if the candidate is from their firm, their local AIA Chapter, or if they served together on a national board or committee.
- All participating jurors review the application together during presentation.
- The presenting juror highlights key aspects of the portfolio, answers questions from participating jurors and makes a recommendation.
- Jury discussion is typically 15 minutes total for each candidate and then a vote is taken.



REFERENCES

Your letters should speak to your impact and your results and be written by those who can make the best case. Some letters from clients or industry leaders outside the profession can be very effective when applicable.

Do review the current application for requirements on quantity of AIA member letter writers. Your sponsor should confirm the required number have <u>active</u> membership to avoid disqualification.

One page maximum length is strictly enforced.

- Only Fellows should write reference letters
- Identify who can best support your story
- Only members should write reference letters
- Other than the minimum required letters from AIA members, letters from nonmembers such as clients, industry leaders, and others can be very effective
- Letters from Big Names are Best
- Writers should know you and provide specific support for your story

THERE ARE NO QUOTAS!

Jurors review the qualifications for advancement **BASED ON THE CONTENTS OF THE APPLICATION SUBMITTED.**

There are <u>no quotas of any kind</u>.

The criteria for advancement used by the jurors is provided in the current sample application.

- Any number of qualified total candidates may be advanced
- Any number of qualified candidates per object can be advanced
- Any number of qualified candidates per component or region can be advanced



TIMELINE

- Review the deadline carefully and remember what time-zone you are in!
- Uploading application takes time do not wait until the last hour
- Jury convenes in Q1, then results are provided to AIA staff
- Results are released to the public in early spring


